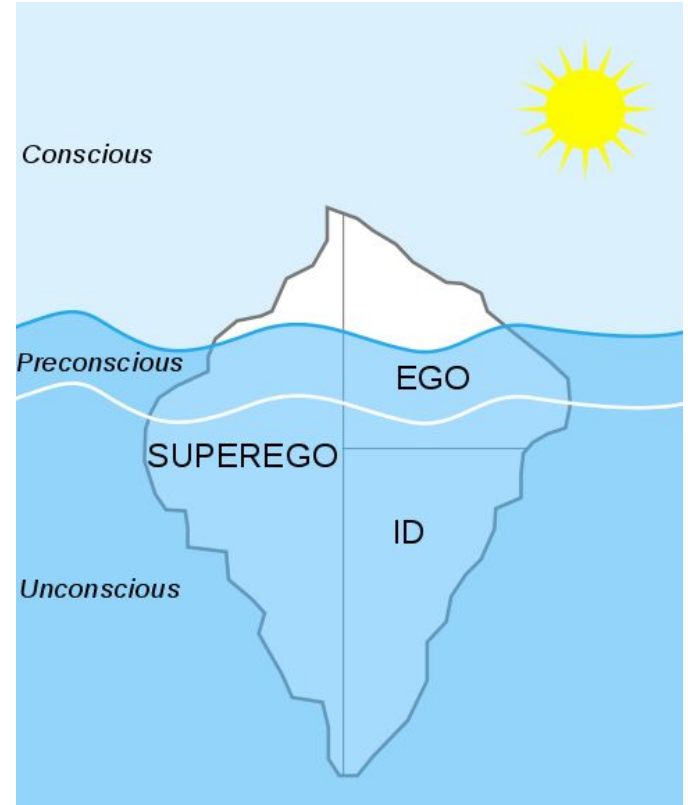


What's in your Head

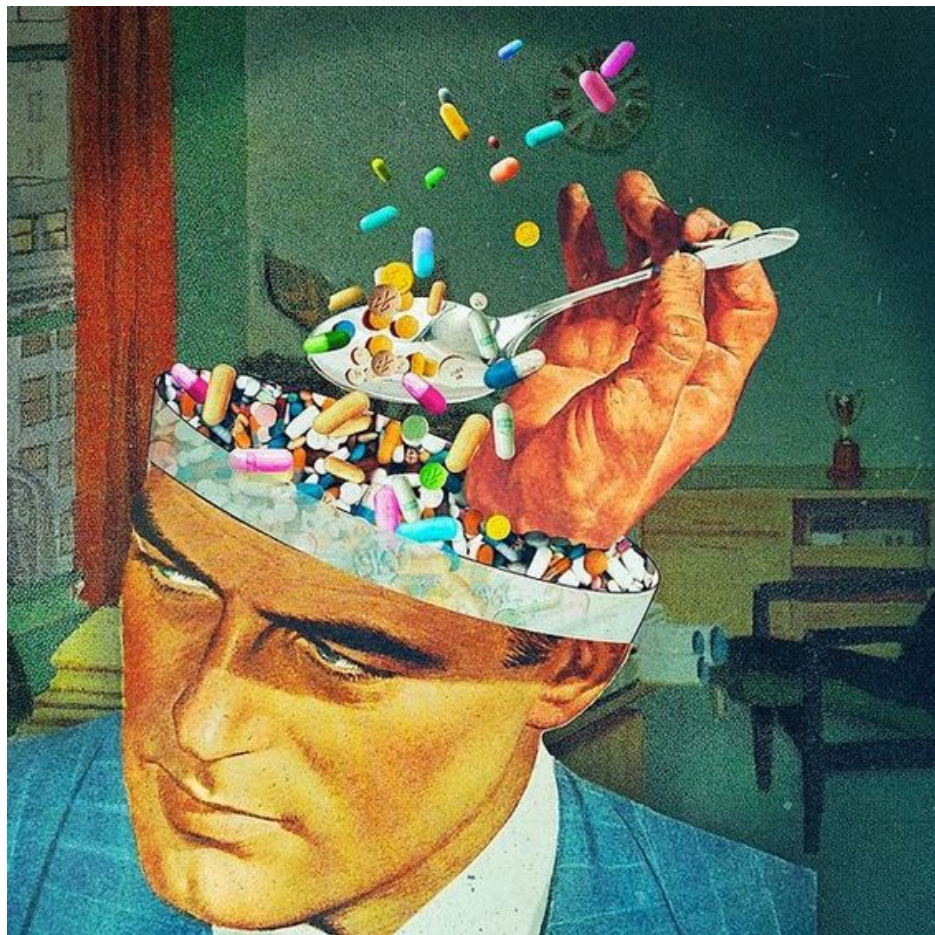
Surrealist portrait

Surrealist were interested in creating dreamscapes and representing the Unconscious Mind. Today we're making surrealists portraits inspired by the work of Peter Nudo.



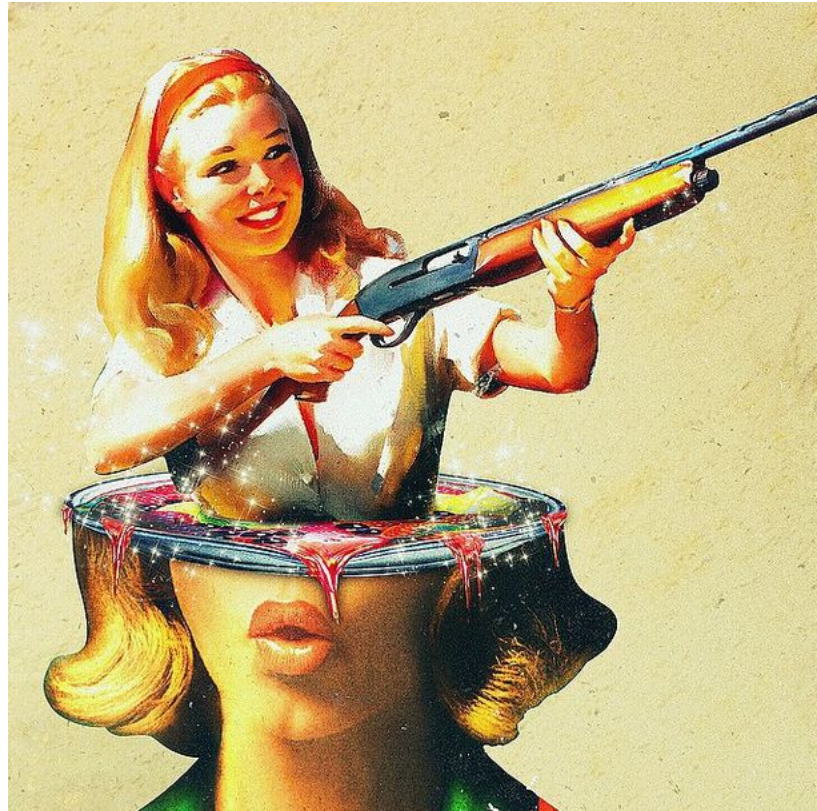

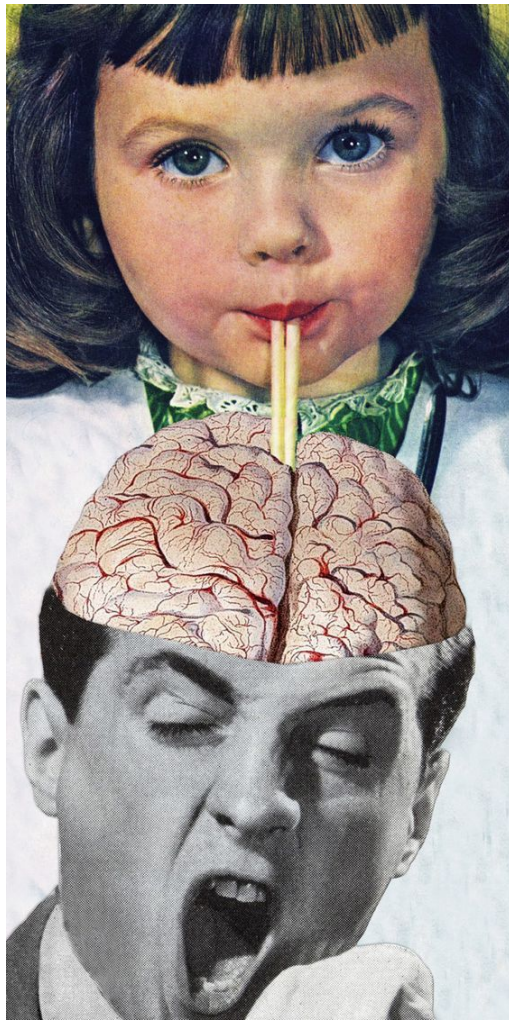
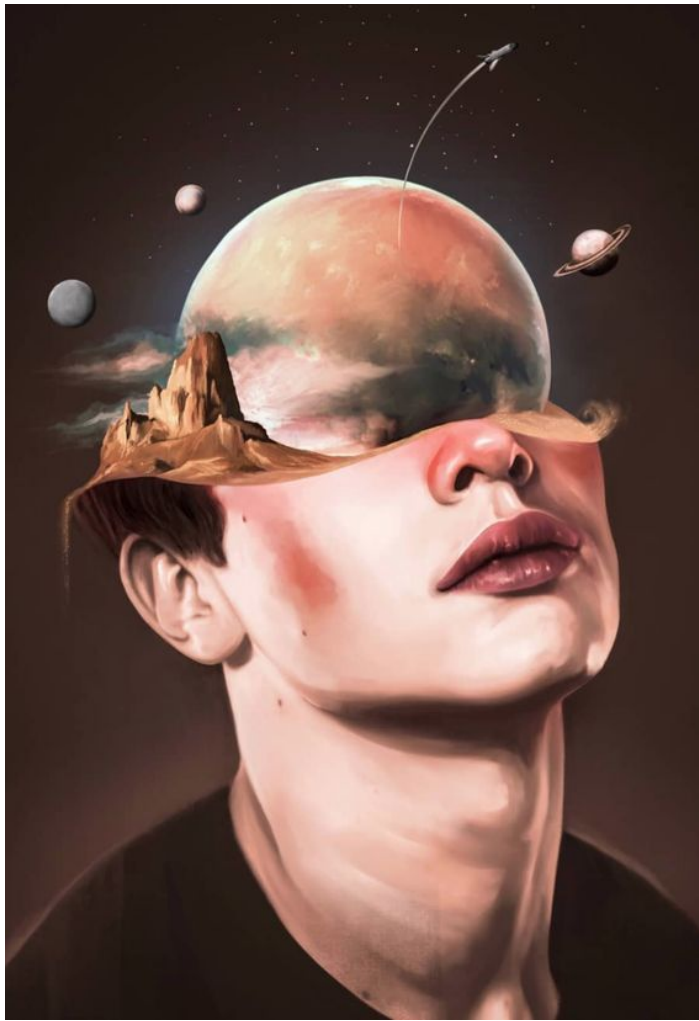
Today we're going to be making our own portraits inspired by his work and also playing around with what could be in the unconscious mind of our subject matter.

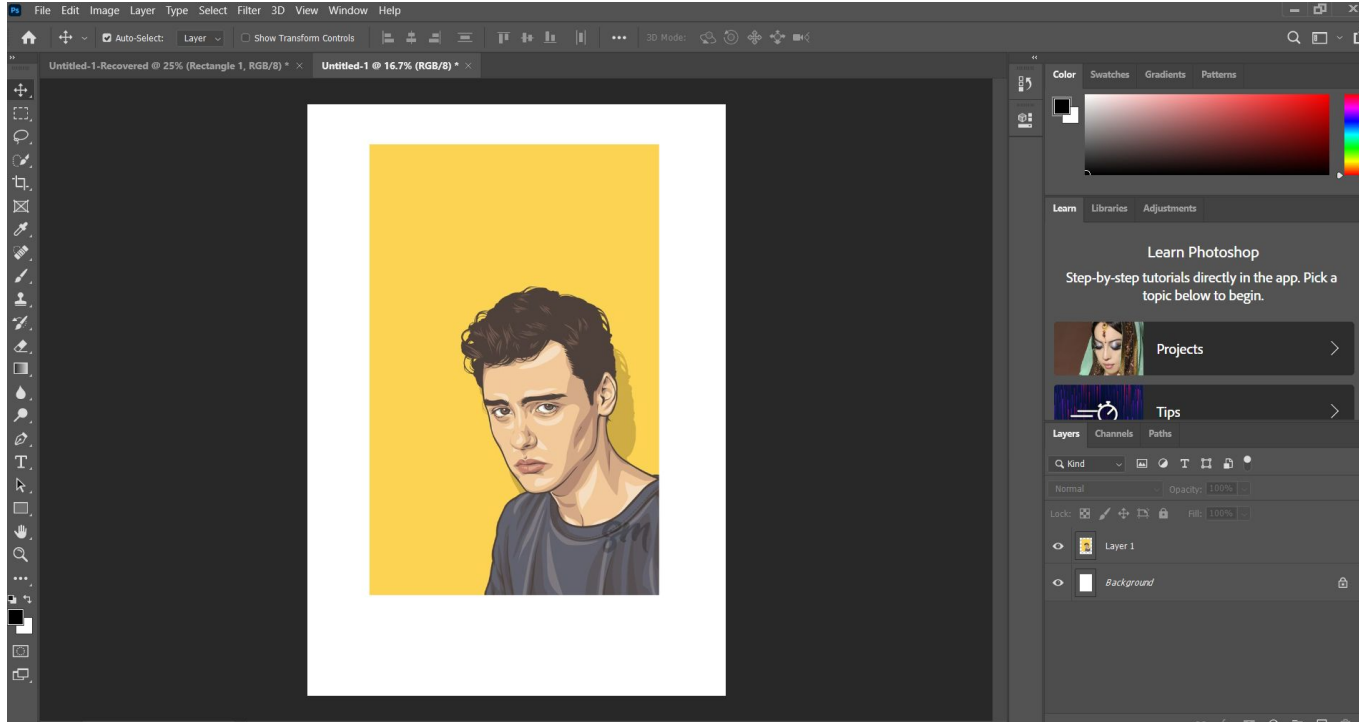

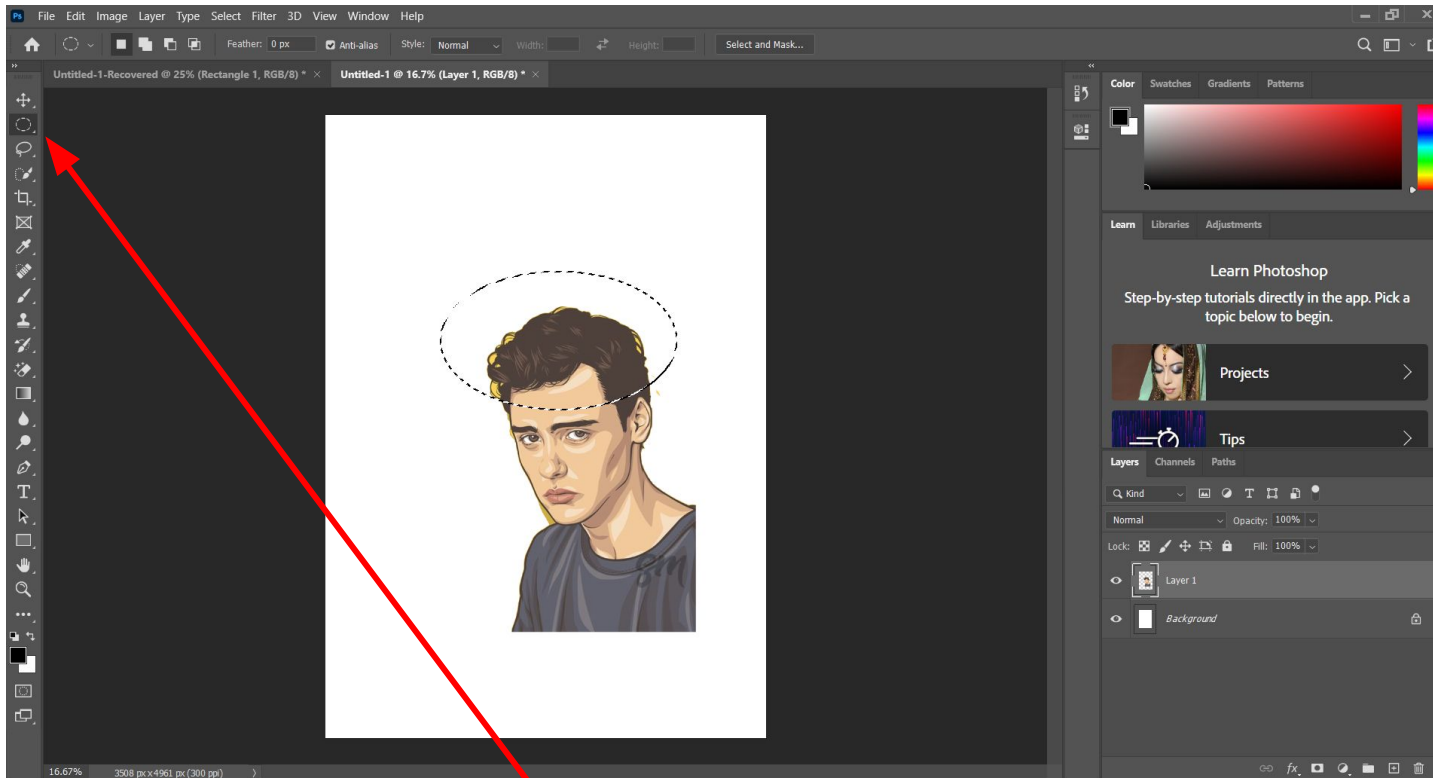






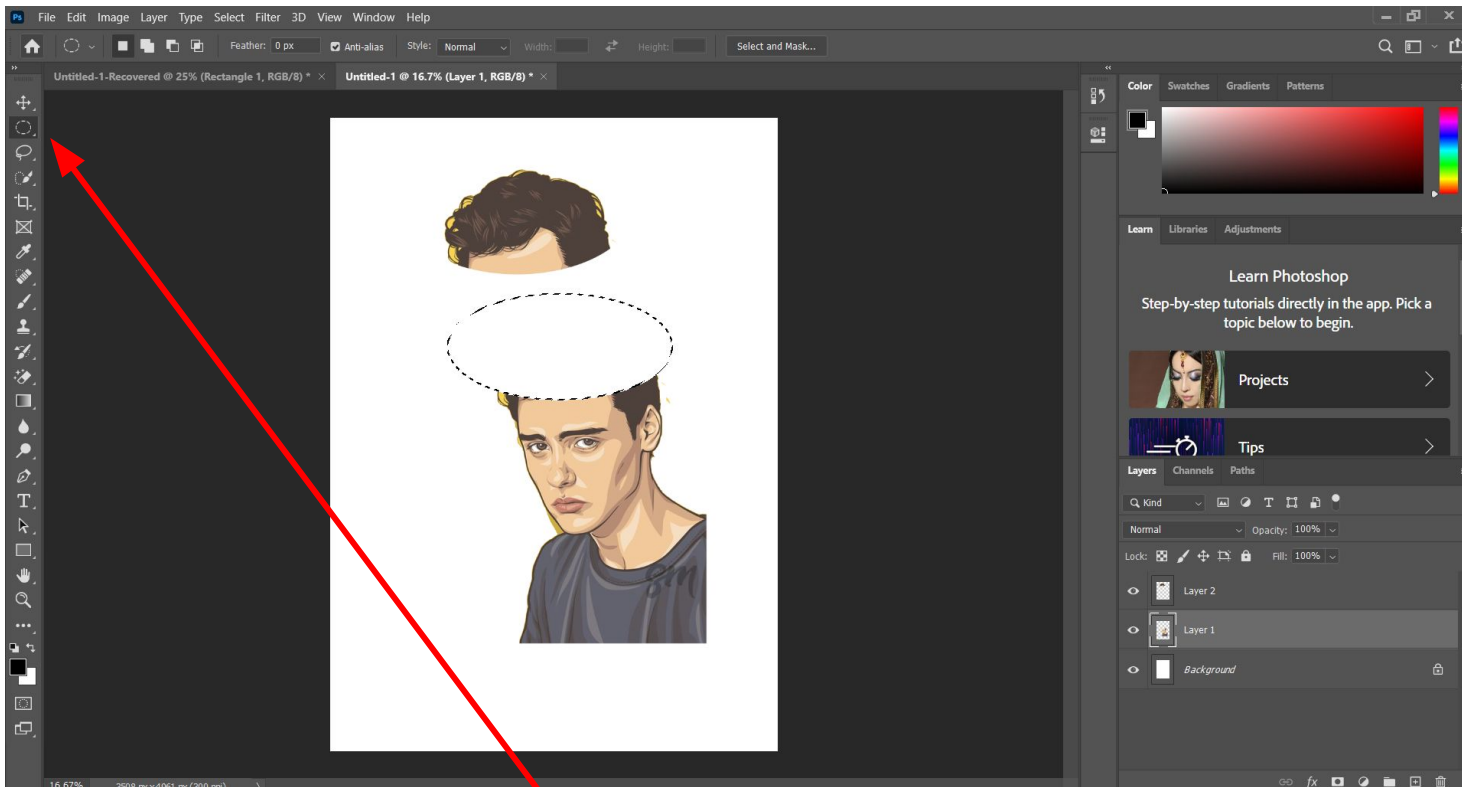


1. Open up an a3 document in photoshop.
2. Select a portrait that you want to use. You can use pinterest or google, but make sure your image isn't pixelated!
3. Cut out your portrait from its background using either the select tool or lasso tool.



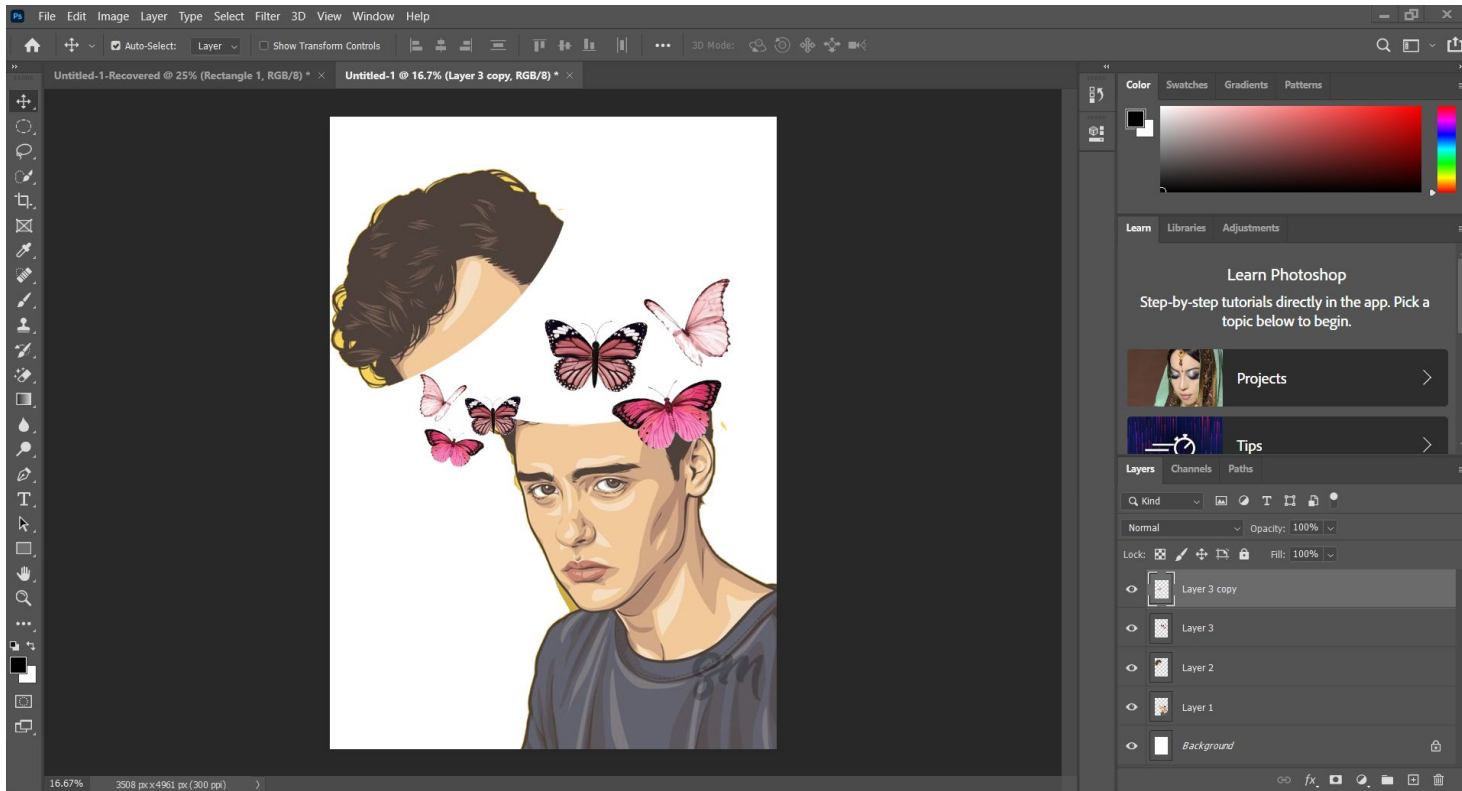
4. Using the eclipse select tool select the portion of your subject head that you want to cut off. Copy and Paste.

Circle ellipse tool.



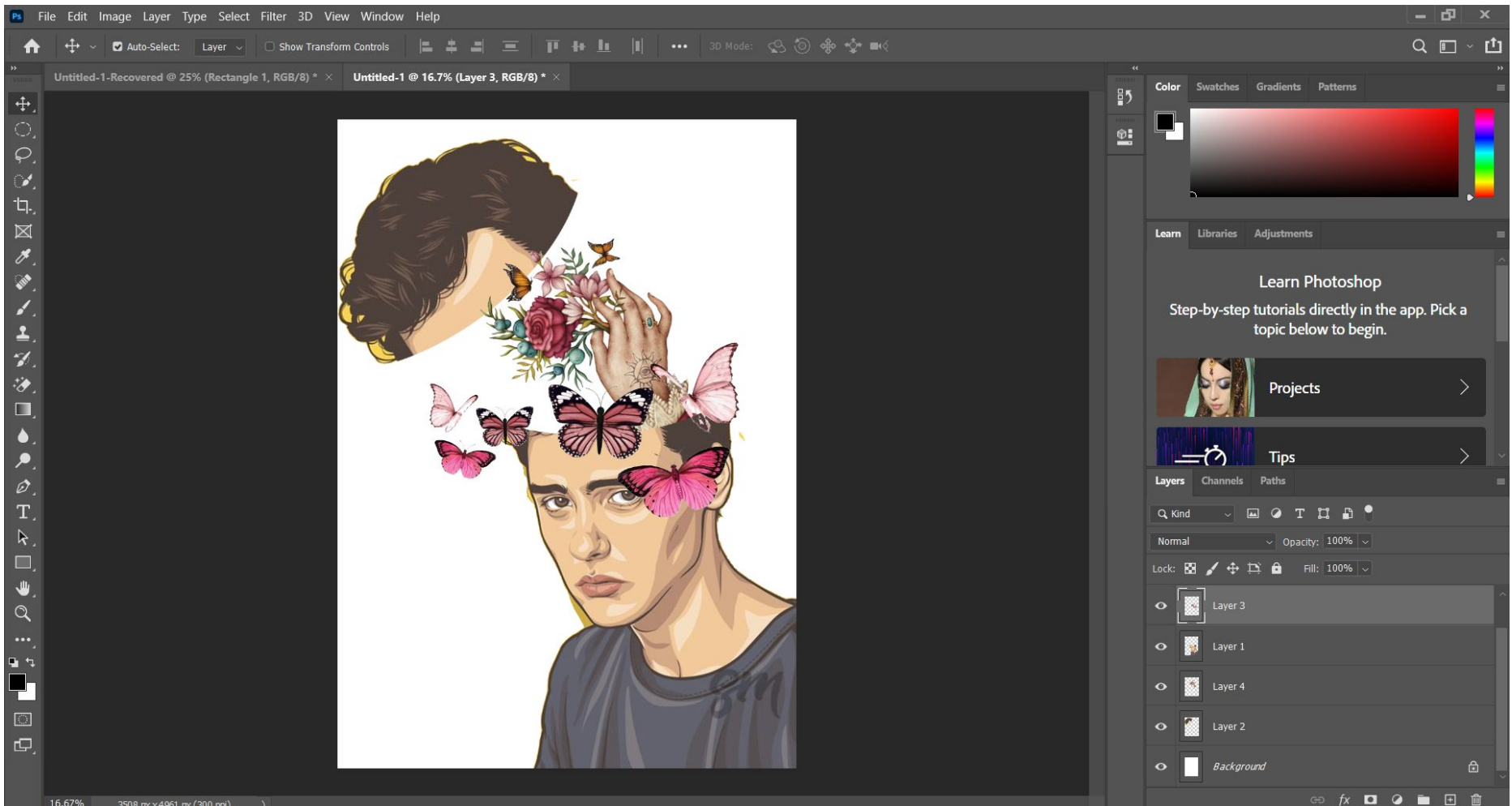
Circle ellipse tool.

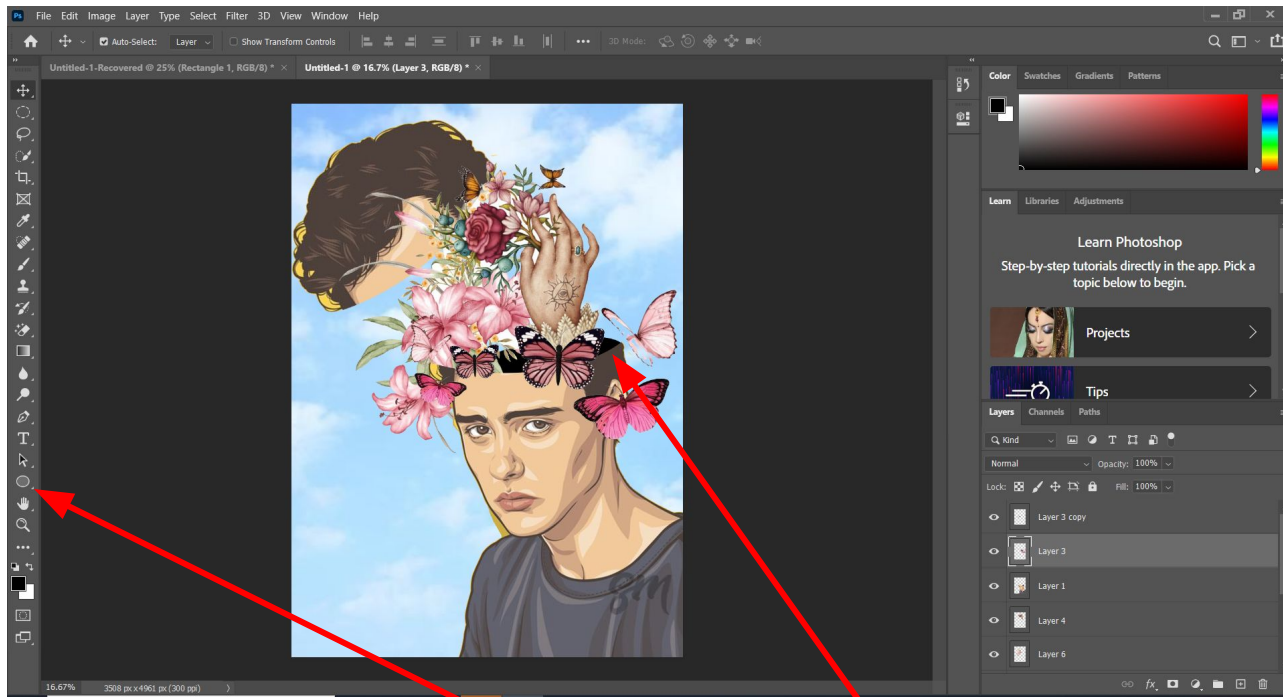
5. Use the elliptical select tool again over your first layer. This time instead of using copy and paste, delete the selected area with the **Backspace** button.



6. Start filling your head with images.

You can be as odd and weird as you like (that's the fun of surrealism!) but you can't include anything offensive i.e. drugs/alcohol/nudity.





7. Add a background that complements your image.

I used this ellipse tool to create an oval shape to make the head look more 3D

Criteria

1. Your image needs to be on an A3 document
2. Your subject matter must be human
3. You can fill your subject matters brain with anything as long as it is not offensive
4. Save your **photoshop** file in the student shared drive.
5. Save as a jpeg in your student shared drive.
6. Insert into your art digital workbook.
