MUSEUM VISIT

Make sure you complete the following during your visit to the Auckland War Memorial Museum

During our museum visit, students will actively engage with Māori culture by identifying and documenting at least five different Māori taonga. This task involves capturing detailed photos, creating drawings, and reflecting personally on the significance of their museum experience

Photography:

Take clear and detailed photos of each taonga. Ensure that your photos capture important details, craftsmanship, and any accompanying information or labels.

Drawings:

For each taonga, create a detailed drawing that highlights key features. This could include patterns, shapes, and any unique elements that stand out to you.

Personal Reflection:

After exploring the Māori exhibit, find a quiet space in the museum to reflect on your experience. Consider the following questions in your reflection:

- What emotions or thoughts did the Māori taonga evoke in you?
- How do you think these taonga reflect the rich cultural history of the Māori people?
- Did you learn something new or surprising during your visit?
- How has this experience changed or deepened your understanding of Māori culture?

After our museum visit exploring Māori taonga, you will visually document your findings over two pages.

POSSIBLE CONTEXTS TO EXPLORE

Japanese Tea Ceremony:

Explore the traditional Japanese tea ceremony, known as "茶道" (sadō) or "茶の湯" (chanoyu). Investigate the cultural significance, rituals, and symbolism associated with this practice.

Chinese Paper Cutting:

Dive into the art of Chinese paper cutting, known as "剪纸" (jiǎnzhǐ). Explore the cultural motifs and symbolism embedded in this traditional craft.

South African Beadwork:

Explore the rich cultural heritage of South African beadwork, a traditional art form that has deep roots in the diverse communities across the country.

Australian Aboriginal Art:

Explore Dreamtime stories from Australian Aboriginal cultures. Investigate the role of storytelling, art, and symbolism in conveying cultural beliefs and history.

Māori Whakairo (Carvings):

Consider exploring Māori whakairo (carvings). Investigate the significance of traditional Māori carving in conveying cultural narratives, genealogy, and spiritual beliefs.

Greek Vases:

Explore the intricate world of ancient Greek vases, renowned for their exquisite craftsmanship and storytelling. Greek pottery offers a window into the daily life, mythology, and artistic achievements of ancient Greece.
