




Task 1: Korero & Demo

Learn about koowhaiwhai whakapapa - write/draw about this in your books

- Think about: how koowhaiwhai connects to the natural world..
- Think about: how koowhaiwhai connects to our tikanga, our whakapapa, us as tangata whenua...
- Where do we see koowhaiwhai?
 - O Why is it important?
- What purakau/stories does it tell us about?



Task 1B: Demo

Draw different types of Maaori patterns and write about their meanings.

- Koowhaiwhai

- Taniko/Tukutuku









Task 2:

Create your own toi Maaori pattern using koowhaiwhai

- You will draw three different designs inside a shape of your choice
- Size A5 (half your page, drawn in your visual diary)
- Think about how you could connect to your pattern you create.
 - If you had to write a story about your design what would it represent to you?

Try these sentence starters:


- I choose this design because it connects to my...

And also write about why you did not choose your other design.. These only need to be small notes, not essays!!


Task 3: 'Stencil' Process

Create a stencil from your koowhaiwhai design:

- 1. Choose your koowhaiwhai design and make sure it's about A5 size
 - We can **enlarge on the photocopier** if needed
- 2. Using carbon paper (black ink paper) trace your design onto A4 paper
- 3. Mark out where the bridges are to stay so the stencil does not fall out
 - A bridge is a part of a stencil's design and can be used for stability. Bridges connect floating elements called islands and keep them attached to the rest of the stencil.
- 4. Photocopy your stencil with bridges
- 5. Using glue spray, spray your A4 photocopier paper to A4 photocopier paper.
 - Place A4 design in middle of the page and use tape on one side to secure before spraying with glue
- 6. Using a craft knife cut out the parts that are not connected and leave a space, this should not be the koowhaiwhai design but the background
 - Remember to go slowly and carefully, start in the middle of your design and work outwards

Task 6: Portrait stencil

Create a 3 layered portrait stencil

 The portrait should represent a significant person of your choice.

A **significant person** is someone who you respect, look up to or is very special to you, its someone of importance.

Example: Someone in your whaanau, like your parents, grandparents, aunty/uncle, close family friend, someone from your hapu/iwi or a known person of importance like a president- Obama, a Chief from your whakapapa, historian...etc.





Task 6B: Who is important to you?




Don't forget to ADD a colour photo of your person you choose



Some questions to consider: What does your artwork look like? What is the subject matter? What is the title of your work? What elements or principles are most obvious in your work?

Some questions to consider: What did you learn in creating this artwork? Is the final piece what you imagined? How so? How will this piece influence your future artworks?
